1. SITUATION

- a. Enemy, See Annex B to Base Order
- b. Friendly situation. See Annex A to Base Order

2. MISSION:

a. CBT – The Rifle Bayonet Committee conducts 7.5 hours of Rifle Bayonet Training at WA799786 from 4-8 August 2004 to instill the skills required to fight and win, overcome personal fear, and surmount personal weakness.

b. CFT - The Rifle Bayonet Committee conducts 8 hours of Rifle Bayonet Training at WA799786 from 21,22 JUN, 8, 21, 22 JUL, & 2,3,5 AUG 2004 to reinforce instill the skills required to fight and win, overcome personal fear, and surmount personal weakness. On order conduct tactical foot march.

3. EXECUTION:

Intent: To fight and survive on today's battlefield, all soldiers must possess the mental and physical strength to overcome momentary weakness. Therefore, both CFT and CBT Regiments will receive basic rifle bayonet instruction, participate aggressively in pugil competition, and apply the basic skills and experience of pugil competition to successfully negotiate a simulated combat rifle bayonet assault course. The specific key tasks leading to the desired end states for each regiment are:

CBT key tasks and end state.

- (1) Train cadet cadre in basic rifle bayonet and pugil stick fighting techniques (T3)
- (2) Train the cadets in offensive, defensive, and combination rifle bayonet techniques
- (3) Train cadets in pugil stick fighting techniques
- (4) Train cadets to negotiate obstacles and rifle bayonet assault course
- (5) Endstate: CBT – Cadets trained in basic rifle-bayonet techniques; physically and mentally challenged; instilled with the Bayonet Warrior Spirit, demonstrated the "Warrior

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Ethos” qualities of refusing to accept defeat, never quitting, and trained and equipped to kill the enemies of the United States in close combat, and with all training executed without injury to personnel.

CFT key tasks and end state.

- (1) Retrain the cadets in offensive, defensive, and combination rifle bayonet techniques
- (2) Execute Physically Challenging 11K Foot March to Standard as a platoon
- (3) Train cadets to negotiate obstacles and rifle bayonet assault course as a fire team
- (4) Cadets practice command and control at Fire Team, Squad, Platoon and Company levels
- (5) End state. Cadets retrained in basic rifle-bayonet techniques through a physically challenging event; Bayonet Warrior Spirit reinforced without redundancy; Cadets having demonstrated the “Warrior Ethos” qualities of refusing to accept defeat, never quitting, and equipped to kill the enemies of the United States in close combat and all levels of the Company having shot, moved and communicated with the opportunity for Yearlings to “Lead the Charge.”

a. Concept of operations. This operation is a 3 phase operation. Phase 1 is preparation and rehearsal. Phase 2 is execution of CFT and CBT bayonet training days. Phase 3 is site recovery. Phase 1 – Preparation and Rehearsal. This phase begins on 31 MAY 04 with arrival of TF personnel. TF personnel and site OIC conduct final coordination for resources. TF personnel sign for site and transport all resources to site locations. TF personnel with augmentation (minimum 1 PLT) conduct rehearsals for both CFT and CBT execution. Finally, TF site personnel conduct final validation with senior DMI and post leadership. This phase ends on 16 JUN 04 with final validation of committee. Phase 2 – Execution of CBT and CFT training. This phase begins on 21 JUN 04 with the first CFT Company conducting training. CFT Companies train 21, 22 JUN, 8, 21, 22 JUL, and 2, 3, 5 AUG 04. CBT cadre conduct Leader Training on 12-15 JUL 04 with two companies of cadre training per day. CBT companies conduct their bayonet training 4, 6, 7, 8 AUG 04 with two companies training per day. This phase ends on 8 AUG with the last CBT Company conducting training. Phase 3 – Site recovery. This phase begins on 9 AUG 04 with recovery of the Bayonet training site. TF personnel recover all resources from the site and return all property to USMA S-4 warehouse. This phase ends on 13 AUG 04 with all ammunition, supplies, and vehicles turned in to S-4 warehouse and TF Hand receipt cleared.

(1) Maneuver. The general scheme of maneuver for a CBT company training day begins with a company arriving by truck at 0700 on the day of training. Two CBT companies will train per day and both receive 7.5 hours of training. Upon arrival, the first company receives a demonstration from the TF and conduct .5 hours of equipment issue. Upon completion of equipment issue, the company as a whole conducts 1 hour of basic stance / movement training, 1 hour of offensive skills instruction, and 1 hour of defensive skills training. The company then breaks down into platoons and conducts 1.5 hours of pugil training and competition. Platoons then rotate through 2.5 hours of Bayonet assault course (RBAC) orientation, rehearsal, and execution. CBT Companies execute the RBAC at fire team level. The first CBT Company departs NLT 1430. The second CBT Company arrives NLT 1200 Hrs, conducts the same

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training, and departs NLT 1930 Hrs. CBT Leader Training follows the same schedule and scheme as a regular CBT company See TAB 1 for example timeline for CBT Training day and concept sketch.

The general scheme of maneuver for a CFT company begins on the day prior to execution with company leadership receiving their training order. One CFT Company trains on each designated CFT training day. CFT companies arrive on foot NLT 0600 hrs. First, the company receives a demonstration from the TF and conduct .5 hours of equipment issue. Upon completion of equipment issue, the company as a whole conducts 1 hour of basic stance / movement, offensive skills, and defensive skills refresher training. The company then breaks down into platoons and conducts Troop Leading procedures. Upon completion of Troop Leading Procedures, the platoons conduct an 11K tactical foot march along a designated route. Platoons begin road march in .5 hour intervals. Upon completion of the 11K footmarch, platoons then transition into execution of the RBAC by fire team (1 hour). Upon completion of the RBAC, platoons then conduct 1 hour of after action review and equipment turn in. The first platoon redeploys by foot NLT 1230 with the last platoon departing NLT 1400. See Tab 2 for example timeline for CFT Training day and concept sketch.

- (e) Issue Training Order on night prior to training (CFT Only)
- (f) Develop Packing list IAW guidance from CFT S-3 (CFT Only)
- (g) Provide Company Command Element to man TOC to provide C2 for Tactical Foot March (CFT Only)

- (a) Deploy with the following references: BCT POI 21-114 Bayonet TSP (1 OCT 98), FM 21-18 Foot Marches (1 JUN 90), BCT POI 21-114 Tactical Foot Marches TSP (1 FEB 00), FM 3-25.150 Combatives





1. Sample CBT Training Day




2. CBT Concept Sketch


